

Blue Tier

Households receiving any of the below government assistance programs:

- Snap/EBT
- Live in HUD or Public 8
 Housing
- SSDI recipient
- Experiencing homelessness or living in a shelter

Orange Tier

Households making <u>below</u> the MIT living wage for Columbia County

1 Adult (no Children) < \$36,666

Columbia County Recovery Kitchen (CCRK)

- Current location Christ Church Episcopal
- Prepares and delivers 940 prepared, delicious, cost free meals made with fresh local ingredients
- One or two meals a week to residents most at risk
- Over 100 volunteers
- County wide deliveries
- Donated and purchased local foods





Rural Food Access Program


- All locations served are designated by the USDA as either low income (LI), low access (LA) or both (LI) and (LA)
- Enables CCRK to delivery a third meal a week to homeless shelters
- RG19 delivers this additional meal along with pre-order groceries selected from list of local staple products
- Groceries are purchased with electronic benefits at the the blue tier price level



Regular meetings with the Commissioner of Social Services



Where its going





Reach working poor, elderly and others who participate in DSS Programs

Move the existing RG19 storefront next to the existing location.



The existing location will functions as the Rural Food Access Program packing and facilitation center and backstock inventory for retail

Offer "to-go" pre-cooked meal options at RG19 storefront



CCRK to purchase local raw ingredients through RG19 and prepare "to-go" options to sell on the tiered pricing system at retail location

Establishing a Hudson Community Food Hub



Partner with other community groups, farmers and local food initiatives to create an integrated system to become the county's Food Hub
